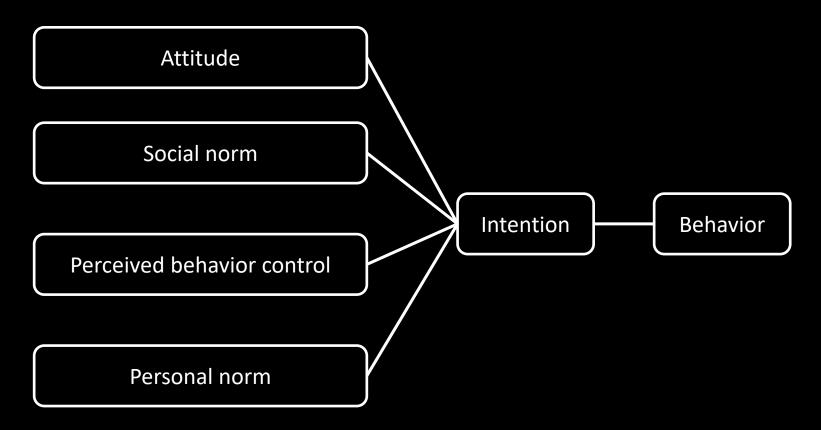

Intention is defined as the motivation required to perform a particular behavior

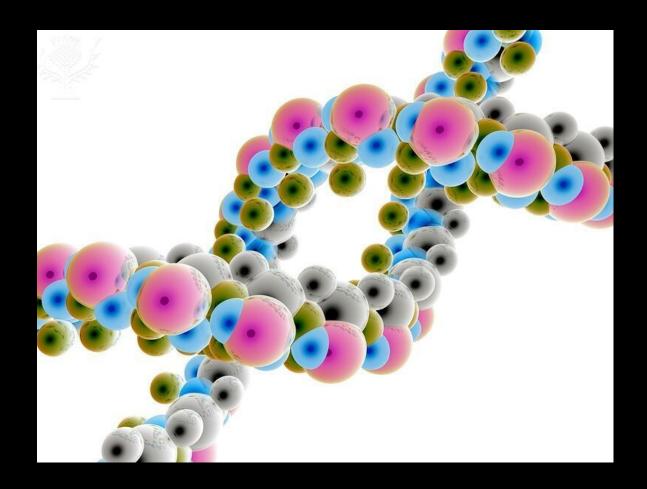

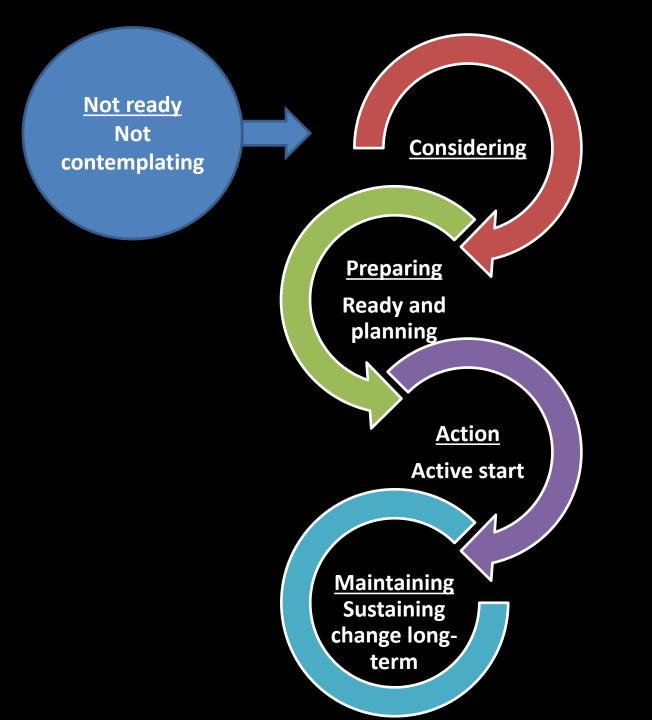

Data collection

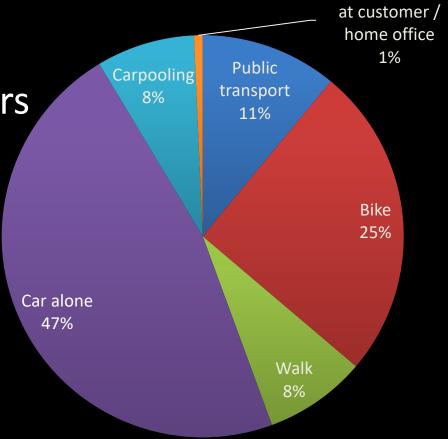
- Voluntary participation, random sample
- 11 work places in Värmland, Sweden
 - Public (56.4%) and private (44.6%)
 - Employees: 10 to 600
- Web-based questionnaire
 - Socio-demographic variables
 - Main mode
 - Attitude (affective and instrumental)
 - Personal norm
 - Social norm (descriptive and injunctive)
 - Perceived behaviour control

Sample

• N=1,132 employees

• Women: 61.4%

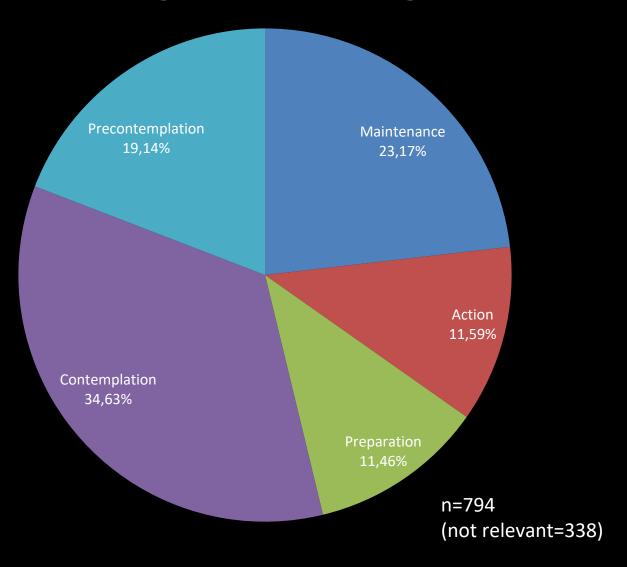
• Mean age: 46.35 years

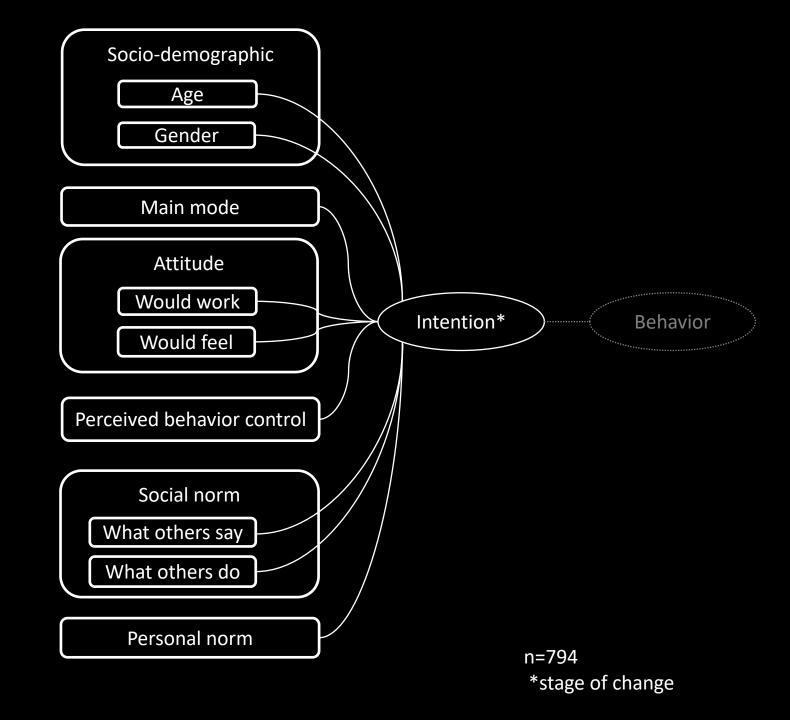

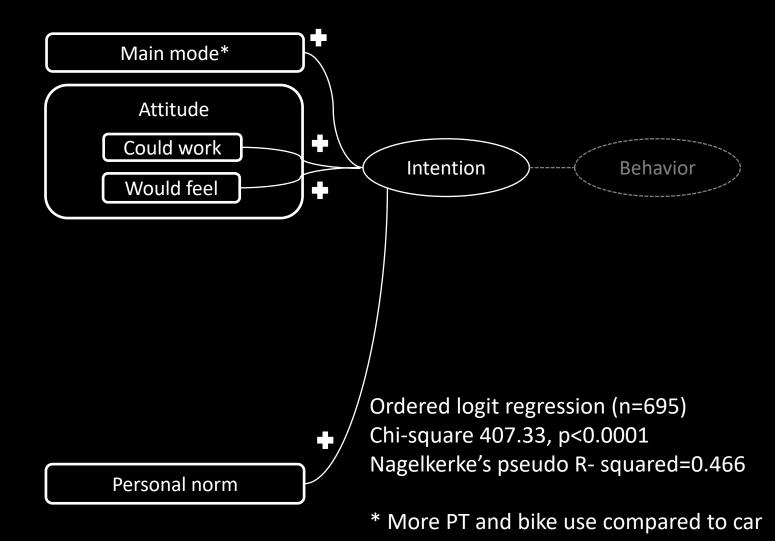

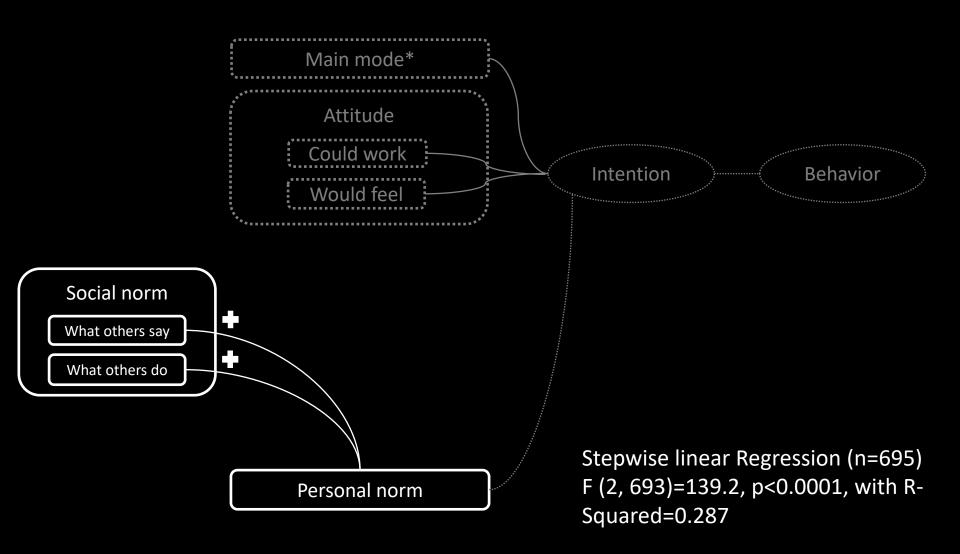




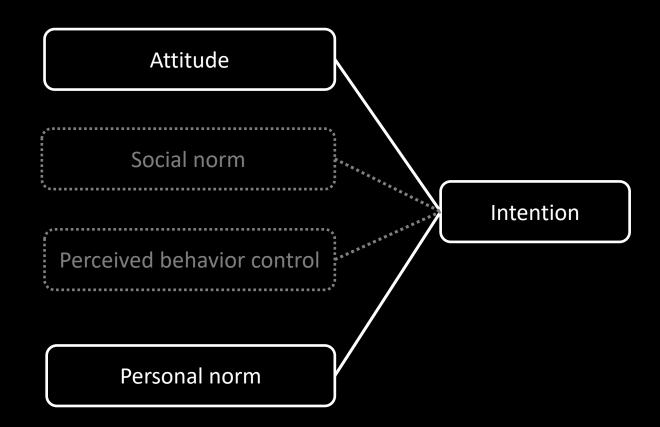
Direct influences



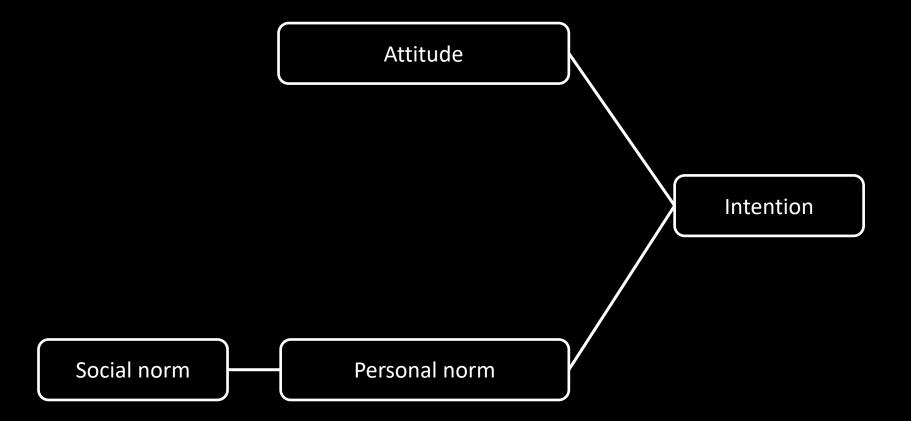
Indirect influence of social norm
